Fathali Moghaddam is professor in the Department of Psychology, Georgetown University, and Editor of the Cambridge University Press Progressive Psychology book series.

Moghaddam's expertise includes cognitive processes and intergroup conflict, with a particular focus on the psychology of radicalization, human rights and duties, democracy, dictatorship, revolutions, and terrorism. His recent books include *The Psychology of Revolution* (2024), *the Psychology of Multiculturalism, Assimilation, and Omniculturalism* (2023), *How Psychologists Failed* (2023), *Political Plasticity* (2023), *Threat to Democracy: The Appeal of Authoritarianism in An Age of Uncertainty* (2019), *Mutual Radicalization: How Groups and Nations Drive Each Other to Extremes* (2018), *The Psychology of Democracy* (2016), *The Psychology of Dictatorship* (2013), *Psychology for the Third Millennium* (2012, with Rom Harre), and *The New Global Insecurity* (2010), as well as numerous other books, journal articles, and book chapters.

He has been an active member of the IAAP Task Force on Terrorism and Peacebuilding since 2016. Among his awards is the Outstanding International Psychologist Award for 2012 from the American Psychological Association's Division of International Psychology. He holds a B.A. from the University of Liverpool and M.Sc. and Ph.D from the University of Surrey, England. February 2019.
