Daniel Dodgen, Ph.D., directs the office of Operational Policy and Strategic Planning for the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). This encompasses mental health, community resilience, national health security, health system policy, and at-risk individuals. Dr. Dodgen served as the Executive Director of the White House directed national advisory group on disaster mental health and led the nation's mental health response to Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, Maria, Katrina, Sandy, and others; the H1N1 epidemic, the BP oil spill, the Boston Marathon bombing, multiple mass shootings, and other natural and manmade disasters. He was one of the lead authors for The Impacts of Climate Change on Human Health in the United States: A Scientific Assessment. Dr. Dodgen also served as an advisor to the government of Greece and the State Department for the 2004 Olympics in Athens.

Before joining HHS, Dr. Dodgen was Senior Federal Affairs Officer at the American Psychological Association (APA) following a Fellowship with the U.S. House of Representatives. With the Red Cross, he responded to the Los Angeles riots, the Northridge earthquake, the Oklahoma City bombings, and the September 11 Pentagon attack. He received the American Psychological Association 2005 Early Career Award and was elected a Fellow of APA in 2012. He is on the Board of Directors of the International Association of Applied Psychology and is a Harvard Senior Executive Fellow. He is also a licensed clinical psychologist in Washington, DC.

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
